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Important information for teacher/leader

101 CFD Session 1: Who is Jesus?

State name and answer Question: Where is your hometown & What is your favorite holiday?

Pontius Pilate (governor of Judea) asked the question: "What shall I do, then, with Jesus who is called Christ?" Matt 27:22

To answer that question personally you might first need to understand who Jesus is.

Was He more than just: a man, a great teacher, a religious leader? Matt 16:13-16

 - Josephus (Jewish Historian)
 - Lucian (Greek writer)
 - Mara Bar Serapion (Syrian Writer)
 - Gnostics (Gnostics were a cult that believed God was not personal and salvation came through knowledge) (Gnostics is the Greek word for knowledge)
- Evidence within the New Testament (Primary sources for the life of Christ)

Jesus didn't' go around with a t-shirt saying "I am God." When you look at everything he taught and said there is little doubt he was conscious of being a man whose identity was God.

C.S. Lewis Wrote:

"A man who was merely a man and said the sort of things Jesus said, would not be a great moral teacher."

Unless what He said was true!

He would either be a lunatic — on the level with the man who says he is a poached egg — or else he would be the Devil of Hell. You must make your choice. Either this man was, and is, the Son of God, or else a madman or something

worse.

- 3 choices
- 1. He was God
- 2. He was a liar (devil or madman)
- 3. He genuinely thought he was God (lunatic)

EVIDENCE TO SUPPORT WHAT JESUS SAID

- His Teaching look at matt 5-7 and pull out some teachings that transcend time (love your neighbor as yourself).
 - peruse Matthew 5-7 > read together Matt 7:28,29
- His works (John 10:37,38)
- His Character
- Fulfillment of Old Testament Prophecy (300 prophecies / 108 unique)

Jesus fulfilled all 300 hundred prophecies in the Old Testament. Mathematicians have figured the possibility of 8 prophesies being fulfilled has a probability of 1 in 10 to the 17th power, or equal to covering Texas in coins 2 feet deep and blindfolding a guy and he finds one marked coin on the first try.

Romans knew death well. Separation of clot And syrum (blood) is evidence of death.

101 **CFD** Session 2: Why Did Jesus Die?

Ask if they have any questions thus far even if not directly about the material.

PROBLEM

Admitting that we sin is hard but seeing the sin of others and call-Romans 3:23 "All have sinned" ing it out is easier. For instance, we are very hypocritical. Example: tailgaters anger you to know end but it is okay when you tailgate because of course you have a good reason.

Results

THE GREAT DILEMMA

God loves people and hates sin. God is loving but he is also just. Therefore, must God punish those he loves?

Remember the wages of sin are death (spiritual death)

SOLUTION

- God died in our place [Self Substitution] (1 Peter 2:24)
- God's love compelled him (John 3:16)
- The Cross (Isaiah 53:6)

Imagine a judge who sentenced to death a criminal then came around the bench took off his robe and said "I will die in this man's place." In essence this is what God did.

Rom 3:21-26

But now a righteousness from God, apart from law, has been made known, to which the Law and the Prophets testify. 22 This righteousness from God comes through faith in Jesus Christ to all who believe. There is no difference, 23 for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, 24 and are *justified freely by his grace* through the *redemption that came by Christ Jesus*. 25 *God presented him as a sacrifice of atonement, through faith in his blood*. He did this to demonstrate his justice, because in his forbearance he had left the sins committed beforehand unpunished— 26 he did it to demonstrate his justice at the present time, so as to be just and the one who justifies those who have faith in Jesus.

Many had suffered crucifixion on a cross but unique to Jesus was the spiritual suffereing of the cross. He was cut off from God.

Four Images to help understand what was accomplished through Jesus Christ's death and ressurection

1. The Altar (explain concept of altar in O.T.)

- Jesus' atonement for us through faith in his blood (VS 25)
- Hebrews 10:4 Blood required from the beginning
- 1 John 1:7 Jesus blood was shed for us
- Sin's contamination removed

2. The Prison

- Redemption by Christ (VS 24) Christ was the ransom so we could be redeemed.
- Power of sin broken

3. The Courtroom

- Justified freely by His grace (VS 24)
- Penalty of sin removed

4. The Living Room

- Reconciliation (Romans 5:10-11)
- Partition of sin destroyed

Conclusion: The Dilemma is resolved in Christ

God's love and Justice are both demonstrated (Romans 3:22)

Jesus' work on the cross is for all who will believe (John 3:16)

CFD Session 3: How is Salvation Applied 101

Popular/Cultural thoughts about Salvation:

- What matters is that you believe, not what you believe in. We must all have faith in something
- I don't believe a good God would send any one to Hell forever
- No matter what you do in life you will go to heaven if you believe in Jesus
- Doesn't the Bible say somewhere that God helps those who help themselves

Ephesians 2:1-7

Once you were dead because of your disobedience and your many sins. 2 You used to live in sin, just like the rest of the world, obeying the devil—the commander of the powers in the unseen world. He is the spirit at work in the hearts of those who refuse to obey God. 3 All of us used to live that way, following the passionate desires and inclinations of our sinful nature. By our very nature we were subject to God's anger, just like everyone else. 4 But God is so rich in mercy, and he loved us so much, 5 that even though we were dead because of our sins, he gave us life when he raised Christ from the dead. (It is only by God's grace that you have been saved!) 6 For he raised us from the dead along with Christ and seated us with him in the heavenly realms because we are united with Christ Jesus. 7 So God can point to us in all future ages as examples of the incredible wealth of his grace and kindness toward us, as shown in all he has done for us who are united with Christ Jesus. 8 For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God. 9 Salvation is not a reward for the good things we have done, so none of us can boast about it. 10 For we are God's masterpiece. He has created us anew in Christ Jesus, so we can do the good things he planned for us long ago.

How does this passage describe, "how we are saved"?

For it is by grace you have been saved through faith, this not from yourselves it is a gift from God, not by works.

In the last lesson we looked at God's part in salvation but what is mans part?

Faith & Repentance (they are like two wings of a bird)

For repentance see (Matt 3:2, Acts 3:19, Acts 26:20) Repentance means to change your mind indicating a complete turn from one lifestyle and purpose to another.

In verse 8 we read that salvation is given by divine grace. What is grace?

How does Ephesians describe life before salvation?

The depravity of man is an important concept for believers and unbelievers to understand. If man is basically good then we have no need for a savior.

What are two of God's purposes in salvation (Vs 7, 10)?

Salvation by Grace through faith is what separates true Christianity from all other religions

- Gene Getz

Questions to ask yourself

- 1. Have I responded to God's love and experienced God's grace by receiving through faith His free gift of salvation?
- 2. If you are a Christian, are you allowing God's grace to teach you and to conform you to the image of His Son Jesus Christ?

How can we know that we are Christians?

1. God's Word:

- His Word is powerful to introduce Salvation (Romans 1:16)
- The promises of God's Word are unfailing: I will come near to you (James 4:8), I give them eternal life (John 10:28), You will be saved (Acts 16:31)
- 2. Jesus' Work: Jesus work on the cross was fruitful and powerful
 - Gift of God (Romans 6:23)
 - Jesus' death proves God's love (John 3:16)
 - Jesus took our sin upon himself (Isaiah 53:6; 2 Corinthians 5:21)

4. The Ongoing Ministry of the Holy Spirit:

- The Holy Spirit indwells and transforms us from the inside out (Romans 8:9-16)
- The Holy Spirit produces fruit in us (Galatians 5:22)

The power of salvation produces fruit in a person. No person can remain unchanged when saved. To be saved is to forsake a life of sin for the Kingdom of God. All Christians sin but no true Christian will choose to live consistently in sin his whole life.

5. Our Works

- James 2:18, 1 Peter 1:6-7, Titus 3:8

A Christian's life is all about ministering to others and our works will attest to that.

Popular/Cultural thoughts about Salvation:

• What matters is that you believe, not what you believe in. We must all have faith in something The Bible is clear that faith in Jesus Christ is the only way for salvation.

Acts 4:10 Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

• I don't believe a good God would send any one to Hell forever

God wishes all would be saved but many rejected His offer of salvation and stand condemned. God is love but he is also just (1 Tim 2:3-6, 2 Peter 2:1-9). It's hard to believe that God would crucify his only son just to help us escape a short stay in hell. Rather, Jesus gives eternal life; the opposite is eternal judgment which includes hell. A good judge is not afraid to give a life sentence & God is a good judge

• No matter what you do in life you will go to heaven if you believe in Jesus

Those who believe this have likely adopted such a belief because they want to live like they want to, however, there is no support or evidence for this belief in the Bible. In fact the opposite is true according to the Bible, God's grace compels us to live Holy lives (1Peter 1:13-16)

• <u>Doesn't the Bible say somewhere that God helps those who help themselves</u>

No where does the Bible say this. Concerning Salvation we are hopeless without God's saving grace. Concerning our works, salvation produces good works but we cannot by our good works

101 CFD Session 4: Why and How do I pray?

State name and answer Question: Where and what would your ideal vacation be?

The Purpose:

• Communication

Communication is important in every relationship. Likewise it is important in our relationship with God because it allows us to develop our relationships with Him. Communication is two way. In prayer God hears our prayers and we learn to listen to what He has to say in response. We come to God not just as servants but as His children

• Shows are dependence on God

When we pray we are acknowledging that we need and trust God. Prayer is both worship and a call for help. Sometimes prayer is simply focusing on God and exalting Him. Other time prayer is a asking God for help. Why would we ask for God's help if we didn't believe He can be trusted to hear and answer us.

Matt 6:5-13

"And when you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men. I tell you the truth, they have received their reward in full. 6 But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you. 7 And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. 8 Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask him.

9 "This, then, is how you should pray:

"'Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name,

10 your kingdom come, your will be done

on earth as it is in heaven.

11 Give us today our daily bread. 12 Forgive us our debts, as we also have forgiven our debtors. 13 And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from the evil one.'

Christian Prayer

2. To the Father

- (Vs 6) your Father relationships
- (Vs 9) transcendence (Exodus 15:11)

1. Through the Son

During the American Civil War a soldier was given a reprieve to go and talk with the president to request exemption from military service because of a family tragedy. When he came to the White House he was refused a hearing with the president and was sent away. Going to a nearby park he sat on the bench discouraged and frustrated. Along came this young man, who asked the soldier about his unhappy state. The soldier found himself pouring out his heart to the young man. After hearing the soldier the young man said, come with me.

The young boy went to the white house and around to the back. Strangely no guards bothered them. When the entered the back door the guards there also seemed to stand attention or rather ignore them. Finally the young man led the boy down a few hallways to the west wing and just walked right into the oval office where Abraham Lincoln was talking with the secretary of state. Abraham Lincoln looked at the young man and said, What can I do for you Todd. The young man, said, "Dad, you have to talk with this soldier."

Why Pray

1. Prayer aids our purpose:

We were created for a relationships with God and prayer develops that.

- **2. Rewards:** (Matt 6:6)
 - Joy (John 16:24)
 - Peace (Philippians 4:6,7)
- **3. Prayer is effective:** (Matthew 7:7-11)
 - Much is accomplished through prayer (James 5:16)

Does God Always Answer Prayer?

Matt 7:7-8 "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you. 8 For everyone who asks receives; he who seeks finds; and to him who knocks, the door will be opened. 9 "Which of you, if his son asks for bread, will give him a stone? 10 Or if he asks for a fish, will give him a snake? 11 If you, then, though you are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father in heaven give good gifts to those who ask him!

Answer: Yes, but we don't always get what we want. Why?

- God will not do things that are inconsistent with His nature
- Things that impact our harmony with God: Just as there are things that create disunity in our relationships so there are thins that can create disunity in our relationship with God.
 - >Sin that is unconfessed: (Isaiah 59:2)
 - >Unforgiveness: (Matthew 6:14, 15)
 - >Disobedience: (1 John 3:21, 22)

- Things we just get wrong or misunderstand

Wrong Motives (James 4:2,3) Misunderstanding God's will (1 John 5:14)

- We don't like God's answer

Objection: I don't want a rule book. following the Bible restricts you from enjoying life. **Rebuttal:** In a sports game: are people more free if there are no rules and people can play however they want. Or are people more free when there are rules and within those rules people are free to enjoy the games.

God has given us guidelines for how to live, not because he hates us, but because he loves us. God didn't tell people not to murder because he wanted to ruin our fun, rather because he didn't want people to get he hurt—he loves us.

The church is: People of God

1 Peter 2:9,10

- Church = a kingdom/a people belonging to God
- Baptism is the visible mark of being a member of the church (God's people)

Baptism symbolizes 3 main things:

- 1. Cleansing from sin (1 Corinthians 6:11)
- 2. Incorporation into Christ's death and resurrection (Romans 6:3-5, Colossians 2:12)
- 3. Sealing of the Holy Spirit (1 Corinthians 12:13)

3 Uses of "church" in the Bible

1. Universal Church (Ephesians 3:10,21; 5:23,25) Includes all of (but only those) who are truly saved. This is the true church!

Roughly 1,900 million Christians on the earth (almost 1/3 of the worlds population)

Church in some areas is in decline but in others it is growing rapidly

- Persecuted Church (in at least 60 countries yet it still grows)
- third world
- free world
- **2.** Congregation a few to thousands typically meeting in a "church building" Strengths: Exercise of spiritual gifts, impact on community, togetherness

Not all in the local church or those a part of a congregation are not necessarily part of the Kingdom of God (saved)

3. Local Churches (1 Corinthians 16:1,19)

Cells - small groups of people often meeting in homes Strengths: intimacy, accountability, close friends,

The church is: The Family of God

Ephesians 2:14-18; 1 John 5:1 Think in terms of the universal church or those truly saved

NEXT STEPS:

Now that you are finished with CFD you may be wondering, what's next? Below are some options for you to continue growing in faith and connection with our church family.

Membership

If you would like to move toward official membership at Otterbein then the next class you will take is called Connected for Formation (CFF). Many of you signed up for this class already—it will begin starting next Sunday right in the same room at the same time. If you have not signed up for it, you can let your teacher know now that you want to be a part of it or you can wait until next semester to sign up for it.

The next step after CFF will be Connected for Impact (CFI) which is the last step in becoming an official member. This class entails two to three classes and then a one on one meeting with a staff person. To sign up for CFI you will have to wait until our promotion months (January, May and September) and you will be able to signup via your connection card. You can read more about Connected for Impact on our website.

Sunday School and Small Groups

In January, May and September a list will come out of all our groups and classes that participate in our churches semester schedule. These three months are what we call our promotion months, during which you will have opportunity to sign up for any of the classes or groups that are available. Many of our groups and classes will be beginning new studies and what they will be studying will also be listed.

However, if it is in the middle of a semester and you don't want to wait to get connected we encourage you to jump in on any of our groups or classes. You can see a list of our classes and groups on our church's website. This website will also list the leaders of each group along with the days and times they meet. Most groups will also have listed what they are currently studying. From the website you can also connect with the leaders of any group or class via e-mail.
